Learning objectives

- 1. Acquire an appropriate repertoire knowledge for interpreting the stages of Early Childhood and Primary Education.
- 2. Develop auditory, rhythmic, and vocal skills applied to group interpretation and its accompaniment.
- 3. Understand the fundamental functions and gestures of vocal and orchestral conducting, as well as rehearsal pedagogy.
- 4. Analyse simple polyphonic repertoire for children's vocal and instrumental ensembles.
- 5. Grasp the language of music and harness its expressive and communicative possibilities.
- 6. Create basic accompaniments with the piano and ukulele, comprehending their roles.
- 7. Perform pieces in two, three, and four voices a cappella and with accompaniment, demonstrating the ability to collaborate within vocal and instrumental ensembles.
- 8. Showcase the capability to develop specific musical competencies linked to musical accompaniment, classroom management, musical arrangement, vocal training, conducting, programming and sequencing, repertoire selection, and materials creation.
- 9. Employ technological means and resources accurately.
- 10. Promote appropriate use of spoken and written language.

Competences

Subject contents

- 1. Instrumental Training through Musical Accompaniment with Piano and Ukulele.
- 2. Conducting, Orchestra, and Choir:
- Vocal Technique applied to the choir and individual vocal technique: interpretation and listening of pieces with two, three, and four voices a cappella and with accompaniment.
- Polyphonic repertoire: Analysis and research of repertoire for choirs and children's instrumental ensembles.
- Conducting techniques applied to the choir and school instrumental groups.

- Auditory skills awareness and pitch control.
- Rehearsal: Management and organization of the group and voices.

Methodology

This course adopts an inherently practical methodology, where theory finds its purpose through musical expression. By transforming the classroom into an actively musical space and promoting participation, our goal is to facilitate the creation of a resource bank for future educators. While remaining aligned with the curriculum framework, this course specifically focuses on developing essential competencies in future music educators. These competencies encompass musical accompaniment, classroom management, musical arrangement, vocal training, conducting, programming and sequencing, repertoire selection, and materials creation.

The range of activities designed for this course includes classroom practice, the creation of instructional materials, the analysis of audiovisual recordings, as well as individual and group musical performance.

Development plan

During the semester, two major blocks will be worked on simultaneously. The distribution will be as follows:

Know and apply techniques and musical ideas to motivate musical creation, develop phrasing, and cultivate the appropriate musical style and language. - Acquire choral and orchestral conducting skills, as well as their didactic applications to enhance ensemble performance.
- Improve audiation skills awareness and pitch perception skills to ensure precise and harmonious ensemble performance.
- Develop pedagogical techniques and practice organization for effective management of vocal and instrumental groups in the choral and orchestral context.

Evaluation

Taking into account the Regulations for Assessment and Grading of Teaching in the UdL Degrees (Governing Council of February 26, 2014, through Agreement 36/2023 of the Governing Council of February 28, 2023), a continuous assessment system is established. In line with the same educational system promoted in the course, active and cooperative practice will be encouraged at all times. On several occasions, students will be asked to self-evaluate and/or assess the work of their peers.

According to the current regulations, it is a prerequisite to pass with a minimum score of 5 the evaluative activities that account for 30% of the total grade in order to successfully complete the course. While these assessments will have a retake opportunity, if a student fails to submit an evaluative activity, they will not be eligible for the retake.

In the evaluation process, it is considered essential that students demonstrate attitudes compatible with the teaching profession, including active listening, respect, participation, cooperation, empathy, punctuality, refraining from judgment, and responsible use of electronic devices in the classroom. It is important that students are willing to actively participate in all scheduled activities, treating all materials with care and respect, thereby ensuring an optimal learning environment and comprehensive training for future educators.

Specifically, the assessment will assign the following weight to each block:

- Instrumental Training and Piano Accompaniment: 50%
- Vocal and Instrumental Direction Training: 50%

Both blocks must be passed separately in order to be combined. Failing to pass one of the two parts implies not passing the course, even if the combined score is passing.

IMPORTANT NOTES...

- It is mandatory to pass with a minimum score of 5 the evaluative activities that account for 30% of the total grade to pass the course. These activities will have a retake opportunity.
- If a student does not submit an evaluative activity, they will not be eligible for the retake of that activity. The highest possible score in a retake will be a 5.
- In case of plagiarism detection, the UdL regulations will be followed.
- An ABSENT (NO PRESENTADO) in any of the evaluative activities will be scored as a 0.
