Evaluation

The subject will be evaluated through two written partial tests, which will be carried out in the middle and end of the semester respectively, and a final exam, the date of which will be set in a timely manner by the Faculty of Lletres.

The specific agenda of the evaluations will be set in due course.

For the purpose of the final grade, the average of the marks obtained in the partial tests will weigh 50% and the final exam 50%.

Obtaining an average grade of 8 or more points in partial tests will make it possible to release the final exam, which, if the aforementioned condition is met, will be voluntary. If the student receives the possibility of releasing the final exam, the average grade of the partial exams, with 8 or more points, will represent 100% of the final grade.

The final exam must necessarily be passed in order to pass the subject, so that a grade lower than 5 (five) in said exam necessarily implies its repetition in the second call, even if the average of the grade obtained in the final exam with the Average grade of partial tests was greater than 5 (five). Therefore, if a grade below 5 (five) is obtained in the final exam, such grade will not be averaged with any other grade, but will be worth as the final grade for the subject. In case of not having been released from the final exam, the student who does not appear to take it in the first call will appear in the minutes as "not presented".

The average grade of the partial tests retains its validity and its weighting also in case of repetition of the final exam in the second call:
