Continuous assessment. In line with the skills to be achieved, in this course the language is subject to evaluation and, therefore, its inappropriate use may result in a fail. It is recommended to have a minimum level of B1 when enrolling in this subject.

Learning objectives

To consolidate the B1 level of English.

To learn specialized vocabulary of the journalistic, audiovisual and media field and its appropriate use.

To speak to an audience with confidence and spontaneity and with as much fluency and pronunciation accuracy as possible.

To properly prepare a text (oral or written) following a logical order and in accordance with the grammatical, lexical and structural norms of the genre in question.

To conduct an interview and debate on a piece of news, as well as to write a good review and biographical article as examples of chosen disciplinary genres to put the language into practice.

Unit 0: The media (introduction)

Unit 1: Radio

- Contents: radio features; the production process of a radio program; post-production feedback; radio script;
 radio interview
- Language: language of radio presenters; radio specific vocabulary
- Task: interview to a classmate (in pairs)

Unit 2: Magazines

- Contents: magazine covers; magazine contents; planning and writing a true-life story; giving instructions for a photo shoot; profile article
- Language: magazine specific vocabulary; stylistic figures; the language of coverlines

Unit 3: Newspapers

- Contents: headlines; analyzing newspapers (broadsheet and tabloids); planning and writing a newspaper article; presenting and debating about a news story
- Language: language of newspapers and articles; language devices; newspapers specific vocabulary
- Task: presentation of a piece of news and debate about it (in groups of 3)

Unit 4: Cinema

- Contents: screenplay; analyzing films; film pitch; film reviews
- Language: the language of film reviews; cinema specific vocabulary
- Task: screenplay (individual)

Methodology

Oral and written English for the media is designed to develop students' ability to learn by doing and, therefore, the course methodology is learner-centred. That implies that students are responsible for their learning, and they are expected to work through the course materials before, during and after lectures. This course is taught in English and the level of language proficiency required is B1.

This course will take place on **Tuesdays and Wednesdays**, from **3 p.m. to 5 p.m**. There will be two groups: **GROUP 1 (prof. Irati)** will meet in room **2.13**, while **GROUP 2 (profs. Àngels & Guillem)** will meet in room **0.10A**.

This subject is taught in face-to-face format. The following training activities will be combined, which will imply 60 contact hours (HP - in practice 54) and 90 non-contact hours (HNP):

All tests will be done in English. Linguistic accuracy will be evaluated through the standards of B1 CEFR level.

If academic fraud or spontaneous copying is detected, we will apply what is established in the Regulations for the Assessment and Grading of Student Learning in UdL Bachelor's and Master's Degrees.
